25 Years of Biodiversity Conservation in the Philippines: Global Relevance, Local Realities

ACTIVITY REPORT AND EVALUATION

BACKGROUND:



The Philippine Biodiversity Symposium is an annual gathering of biodiversity researchers, conservationists and managers working in the Philippines. It is organized by the Biodiversity Conservation Society of the Philippines (BCSP), formerly the Wildlife Conservation Society of the Philippines (WCSP).

Mindoro Island:

The island of Mindoro, the seventh largest island in the Philippine archipelago, is rich in mineral resources and biological diversity. There are 10 key biodiversity areas on the island. With at least 250 species of birds, 56 mammals, 15 amphibians, 60 reptile species recorded over the past decade, Mindoro Island is one of the hotspots and priority areas for conservation in the country.

The 25th Philippine Biodiversity Symposium



On 5-9 April 2016, the 25th Philippine Biodiversity Symposium was successfully held at the Filipiniana Hotel in Calapan City, Oriental Mindoro. It was co-hosted by the Mindoro Biodiversity Conservation Foundation, Inc. (MBCFI) and the City Government of Calapan, in cooperation with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources' Biodiversity Management Bureau (BMB), the Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO) of Oriental Mindoro, and the Provincial Government of Oriental Mindoro. The Symposium was made possible through our partners from the Department of Education-Calapan City District, the UNEP-GEF FORIS

Project-Philippines, the USAID B+Wiser Program, Philippine Tropical Forests Conservation Foundation, Inc. (PTFCF), Crocodylus Porosus Philippines, Inc. (CPPI), Bat Conservation International (BCI), Center for Conservation Innovations (CCI) Philippines, Primer-CORE, Fauna & Flora International (FFI) — UK, Malampaya Joint Venture, Divine Word College-Calapan City, Globe Telecom and Anvil Publications.









































The celebration of the 25th year of the symposium officially opened on 5 April 2016 with messages delivered by Dr. Antonio Manila, Assistant Director of the Biodiversity Management Bureau, Hon. Arman Panaligan, Mayor of Calapan City, Mr. Facundo Roco, Chairperson of MBCFI, and Ms. Cynthia Layusa, President of BCSP. The opening program continued with a parade around Calapan City – with participants donning hats symbolizing the 25 species illustrated in the symposium logo – culminating in Xentro Mall for the opening of the Institutional Fair. Mascots of Philippine endemic species entertained symposium participants and mall-goers alike as various organizations presented their work through exhibits, posters, and information materials. To formally welcome the participants to Calapan City, the city government organized a welcome dinner at the City Hall.

The succeeding days of the symposium were filled with talks and presentations on various thematic areas of importance to local and international biodiversity research and conservation. The symposium activities included plenary presentations from renowned scientists; scientific oral presentations from high school, undergraduate, and graduate students and professionals; pecha kucha and scientific poster sessions, book launching and presentations, a public consultation on the proposed updating of the Red List of Threatened Wild Fauna in the Philippines (DAO 2004-15), and workshops. The activities during the weeklong symposium were truly befitting a 25th anniversary celebration.

OUTCOME:

 Outcome 1: The 25th Annual Philippine Biodiversity Symposium was successfully held with at least 280 local and international participants in attendance. Various sectors were represented, from academic and research institutions, local and international nongovernmental organizations, local and national government agencies, developmental organizations and private companies.



To support students who are presenting their studies at the Philippine Biodiversity Symposium in Mindoro, the BCSP provided full and partial travel grants to high school and undergraduate student presenters. Specifically, BCSP subsidized the accommodations for all high school and undergraduate student presenters and provided full travel support to 6 undergraduate students. The total travel awards dispersed in 2016 amounted to PHP 158,989.00.

 Outcome 2: Recent scientific information on Philippine biodiversity and ecology are shared through scientific talks and posters. In total, there were 14 plenary talks from invited experts and partner institutions, 51 contributed scientific talks, and 79 scientific posters accepted at the 25th Annual Philippine Biodiversity Symposium.

Select papers from the 25th Philippine Biodiversity Symposium will be published in a two-volume special issue of the Sylvatrop Journal, the technical journal of Philippine ecosystems and natural resources published by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) through the Ecosystems Research and Development Bureau (ERDB).

Outcome 3: Networking among conservation NGOs, government agencies, research
groups and academe, and private institutions was facilitated through the Institutional
Exhibits and networking night. At least 20 local and international organizations and
government project joined the Institutional Exhibit held at the Xentro Mall in Calapan City.



The MOU was signed by partners from the USAID, Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Region 4B, Philippine National Police, and mayors from the municipalities of Naujan, Victoria, Socorro and Pola. The MOA signing was made possible through the USAID Biodiversity and Watersheds Improved for Stronger Economy and Ecosystem Resilience (B+WISER Program).

- Outcome 4: New ideas, skillsets, and tools are shared through special events held during the symposium. Six (6) workshops were held concurrently on 8 April 2016. These workshops provided an opportunity for the participants to contribute to developing guidelines and biodiversity assessment tools; increase knowledge in scientific writing; learn methods in forest protection and community involvement:
 - LAWIN Forest Protection System science, technology and innovation in partnership with communities, private sector and government, Biodiversity and Watersheds Improved for Stronger Economy and Ecosystem Resilience (B+WISER Program)
 - Making effective biodiversity conservation advocacies through social media campaigns, Apolinario B. Cariño; Romualdo L. Señeris; Trelly A. Marigza, Aidalyn C. Arabe
 - Mini-workshop on the enhancement of the draft underwater cave assessment forms, Tanya Conlu, Alex Santos, and the Biodiversity Management Bureau-CAWED
 - Pinoy cinnamons: their state of knowledge and conservation, Edmund Leo B. Rico, Aedryon Ross Javier, Neil Aldrin D. Mallari, Nian Beceril, Lionel Uytico, Florena Samiano, Jay Picardal
 - Scientific writing: improving an abstract, Nina R. Ingle, Terry Horton and members of the Mentoring and Publications Committees, Biodiversity Conservation Society of the Philippines
 - Special meeting of the Ad Hoc committee on bird watching and bird photography protocols, Don Geoff E. Tabaranza, Willem van de Ven, and Biodiversity Management Bureau

A book presentation event was organized featuring new reference and teaching materials that are useful for researchers, planners, and managers alike:

• Outcome 5: The symposium became a venue to hold public dialogue and consultations related to policies that will benefit Philippine biodiversity and conservation. One of the key activities held was a constituency presentation and consultation of the proposed amendments to the Philippine Red List of Threatened Species (DAO 2004-15) organized by the BCSP in cooperation with the Biodiversity Management Bureau. A break-out session for the four taxonomic groups (birds, mammals, reptiles & amphibians, invertebrates) allowed the participants to review the proposed amendments to the list of threatened species, which was prepared by the Technical Working Group of the Philippine Red List Committee (PRLC). The inputs to the plenary presentation and workshop will be forwarded to the PRLC to be incorporated in the drafting of the updated Philippine Red List of Wild Fauna.



Similarly, the technical bulletin on bird watching guidelines was also drafted during one of the concurrent workshops of the symposium. BCSP members play an important role in the bird watching and bird photography ad hoc technical working committee; BCSP board members chair the ad hoc committee.

Outcome 6: Exhibit and IEC materials were prepared for the symposium, including a press statement on the symposium that was released to the media. A meeting with national and local media representatives was organized through the Provincial Information Office on 5 April 2016. The journalists fielded the panel composed of Cynthia Layusa (BCSP), Dr. Antonio Manila (BMB), Ms. Amor de Asi (PENRO), Ms. Marlyn M. Alcañices (Provincial Government), and Mr. Wilfredo G. Landicho (City ENRO). Prior to this, representatives from BCSP, MBCFI, and the Calapan LGU guested at the local radio program, to promote the symposium.


Through the initiative of the Holistic Education and Development Center (HedCEN), an exhibit on the past symposia was prepared and displayed at the Conference Hall. The exhibit featured the different venues that have hosted the annual symposium, along with the themes and photos of each of the symposium that was organized by the Society.


With the help of teachers from the Department of Education-Calapan City Division, headdresses of the 25 species represented in the symposium logo were designed and produced. These 25 species recognize the contribution of the BCSP members to Philippine biodiversity and conservation: these species represent some of the species discoveries or rediscoveries in the past 25 years by members of BCSP. The headdresses were worn and paraded during the opening program and parade.

But beyond conservation, BCSP recognizes that nation-building, especially in time of need, is integral in achieving the vision of the Society. Through our local partners and sponsors, we were able to solicit school supplies and text books from participants, local hosts, and sponsors (i.e. Anvil Publishing), which were donated to schools in Baco, Oriental Mindoro, as well as in Catarman, Northern Samar (the latter hosted the 24th Philippine Biodiversity Symposium). These schools were affected by Typhoon Nona.


EVALUATION:


Participants were asked to rate the events and organization of the symposium, with 5 as Excellent and 1 being Very Poor. Majority of the respondents (88%) rated the symposium as either Excellent or Good. Eighty-six percent of respondents stated that their objectives in attending the symposium were met. The common objectives mentioned included: a) learning new knowledge and skills on Philippine biodiversity research and conservation; b) networking and meeting colleagues, experts, and potential mentors; and c) presenting a study or proposal. Responses to symposium events, talks, workshops, and secretariat and logistics support, based on the evaluation results, show the high approval rating and reflects the success of the symposium in delivering its objectives.








For the events organized during the symposium, majority of the respondents scored the activities as either Excellent or Good. The events and their corresponding scores are reflected in graphs 3-8.


















Plenary talks from invited experts and partner institutions and contributed scientific and poster presentations likewise received an 80% approval rating from the respondents (graphs 9-12).













The survey respondents were asked to rate the concurrent workshops based on a) new applications or insights gained; b) clarity of presentation; c) efficiency of organization and facilitation; d) materials, handouts and visuals aids used; e) time allocated for the workshop. 












In terms of symposium organization and secretariat support, majority of respondents gave scores of 4 or 5 (Good and Excellent). Respondents were asked to score aspects of symposium organization and logistics, including a) registration procedures; b) time management; c) moderation and MCs; d) venues; e) catering and food at the Filipiniana Hotel; f) exhibits, posters, and booths; and g) secretariat support and logistics. Graphs 14a-14g present the scores.

















FINANCIAL REPORT:

Fundraising Activities:

BCSP was able to raise funding for the 25th Annual Philippine Biodiversity Symposium, made possible through high registered participants' turnout, cash sponsorships, and valuable support provided by the local hosts (MBCFI and Calapan City LGU) and partner institutions (Tables 2 and 3). The in-kind support that BCSP received for the organization of 2016 symposium was highly effective in defraying the cost of the symposium. But beyond augmenting costs, these organizations and projects became BCSP's partners in delivering key conservation messages to the participants: institutions like the BMB, local and provincial government agencies, USAID and UNEP were able to tie up with a national NGO like the BCSP, wherein we were able to co-organize events (i.e. workshops, MOA signing) that benefitted these organizations' over-all agenda towards biodiversity protection and conservation, with BCSP acting as a key venue and ally.

This year, BCSP invested on fundraising items (i.e. t-shirts, stickers, and bag tags) that made use of the symposium logo and illustrations designed by artist Prime Premne. The merchandise items were sold during the symposium. This strategy, which BCSP initiated on a smaller scale during the 24th Philippine Biodiversity Symposium in Samar, is a worthy investment to sustain needed funding for the organization as well as the symposium. The silent auction, a regular fundraising event held during the meeting, also generated income for the symposium organization.
